Over the past 38 years, the Nebraska Statewide Arboretum has come to understand that trees and landscapes have a dramatic impact on quality of life - they renew our environment, improve our health, increase social interactions, deepen our sense of place and provide opportunities for learning.

The idea of our founders, a group of committed citizens and University of Nebraska staff, was visionary. How could the best regionally appropriate trees, plants and practices be experienced all across the state?

Our work began by creating a network of grass-roots public gardens and arboretums. Today this unique network of local and accessible arboretums numbers 104. Parks, schools, libraries and other entities represent efforts large and small, many of them undertaken by volunteers, that provide a bright spot in communities from Brownville to Chadron. Recently the Nebraska Statewide Arboretum was honored to invite several new sites to the Lincoln area - Hilltop Arboretum, Vintage Heights Neighborhood Arboretum and the Fireworks Rain Garden.

Our programs have diversified over the years to include community greening efforts, tree and plant growing and numerous education and outreach events.

We grow thousands of trees and plants each year that go out to public and private landscapes across the state. We focus on testing and growing regionally native trees and plants that are well-adapted to complex urban conditions (you can purchase and learn more about these plants at plantnebraska.org).

Our Greener Nebraska Towns program works to make our public landscapes more beautiful and ecologically beneficial. It affects communities where they need it most: funding, technical expertise and practical solutions to environmental challenges. We provide matching grants, and support the design and execution of the projects in collaboration with the University of Nebraska, Nebraska Forest Service.

Nebraska Environmental Trust, local municipalities, nonprofits and businesses. These projects include streets, campuses, schools, parks, libraries, hospitals and other facilities. Not only do they reflect a "sense of place," they are also designed to conserve and clean water, enhance habitat and make a more viable community.

Recently we have focused on creating more ecologically diverse school grounds, partnering with local schools and volunteers. These improved areas provide learning opportunities and physical and mental health benefits that connect kids, families and the whole community to each other and to the natural world.

While Nebraska Statewide Arboretum is certainly about plants, it is also about Statewide Arboretum.
